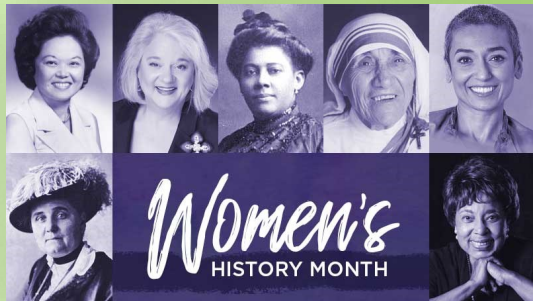

March is Women’s History Month!

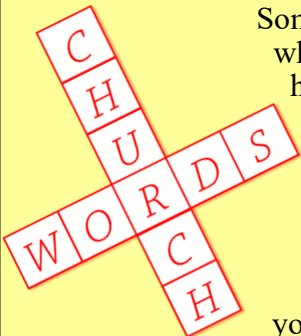

March is designated as Women's History Month in The United Methodist Church, a month in which churches are encouraged to recognize and celebrate the lives and contributions of women to their communities and The United Methodist Church.

In the United States, Women's History Month traces its beginnings back to the first International Women's Day in 1911. In 1978, the school district of Sonoma, California participated in Women's History Week, an event designed around the week of March 8 (International Women's Day). In July 1979, a fifteen-day conference about women's history was held at Sarah Lawrence College, chaired by historian Gerda Lerner and co-sponsored by Sarah Lawrence College, the Women's Action Alliance, and the Smithsonian Institution. When its participants learned about the success of the Sonoma County's Women's History Week celebration, they decided to initiate similar celebrations within their own organizations, communities,

and school districts. They also agreed to support an effort to secure a National Women's History Week. In February 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued a presidential proclamation declaring the week of March 8, 1980, as National Women's History Week. The proclamation stated, "From the first settlers who came to our shores, from the first American Indian families who befriended them, men and women have worked together to build this nation. Too often the women were unsung, and sometimes their contributions went unnoticed. But the achievements, leadership, courage, strength, and love of the women who built America were as vital as those of the men whose names we know so well. [Women’s History] ... is an essential and indispensable heritage from which we can draw pride, comfort, courage, and long-range vision. I ask my fellow Americans to recognize this heritage with appropriate activities during National Women’s History Week, March 2–8, 1980. I urge libraries, schools, and community organizations to focus their observances on the leaders who struggled for equality – Susan B. Anthony, Sojourner Truth, Lucy Stone, Lucretia Mott, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Harriet Tubman, and Alice Paul....Understanding the true history of our country will help us to comprehend the need for full equality under the law for all our people.” In 1981, responding to the growing popularity of Women's History Week, Sen. Orrin Hatch (R-Utah) and Rep. Barbara Mikulski (D-Maryland) co-sponsored the first Joint Congressional Resolution...which authorized and requested the President to proclaim the week beginning March 7, 1982 as “Women’s History Week.” Throughout the next several years, Congress continued to pass joint resolutions designating a week in March as Women’s History Week. Schools across the country also began to have their own local celebrations of Women's History Week and even Women's History Month. By 1986, fourteen states had declared March as Women's History Month.



Sometimes we hear or see words in church and we don’t know what they mean. From time to time, the Lamplighter will highlight and explain some of these words for you. This month’s word is **NARTHEX**.

Narthex– we often see this in Emmanuel’s bulletin. It usually is referring to something happening there, such as “pecans are being sold in the narthex,” or “you can sign up in the narthex!” So, what is a narthex? According to yourdictionary.com a narthex is “an entrance hall leading to the nave of a church.” Now, this poses a problem because many of you are probably asking “what is a nave?” Well, the nave of the church is the section of the sanctuary where the congregation congregates on Sunday morning. At Emmanuel, this is the section of the sanctuary with the pews. That means the narthex is the hallway area outside of the sanctuary. Got it? Good! The both the scripture readings and the articles for the week are brief and the study doesn’t require a lot of prep time before hand. 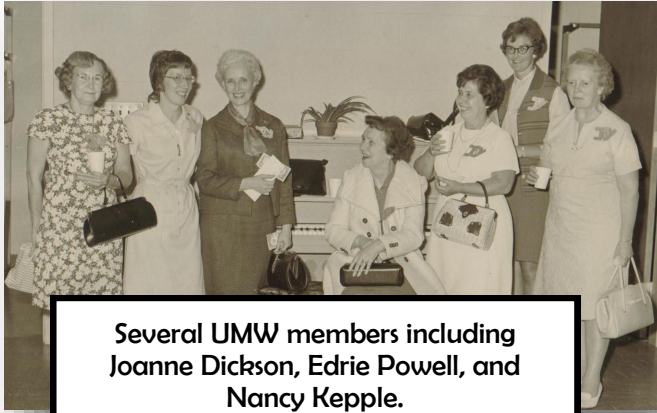

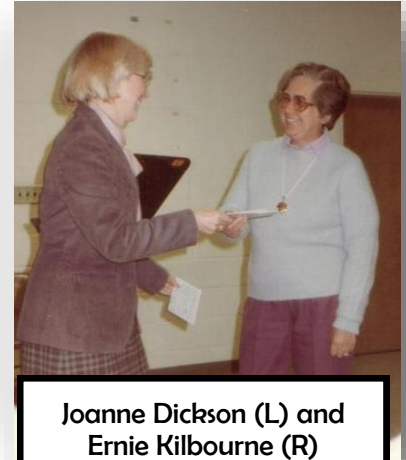

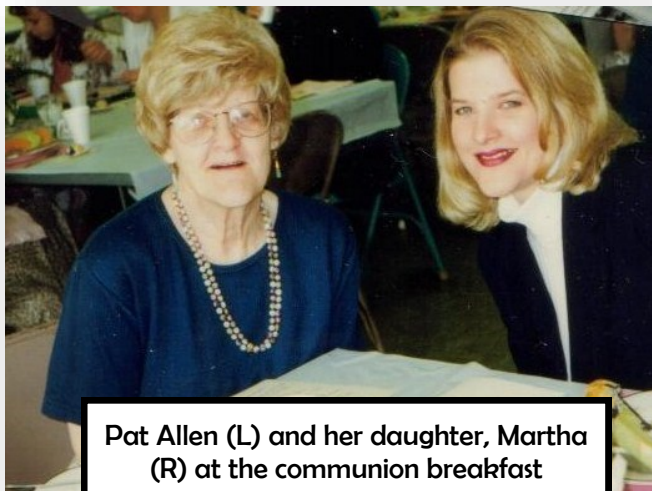

New to the Emmanuel Community...



Community outreach is the lifeblood of any church. Working with community organizations either within the church walls or out in the neighborhood is vital to our community. You may have noticed that there are a some new groups who are meeting at the church on a regular basis. For years, the church has been host to many community organizations such as the Boy Scouts of America, the Depression and Bipolar Support Alliance, the Girl Scouts of the United States of America, and Narcotics Anonymous. Emmanuel added two more to the list this year, Beltsville Community Cats and UpStage Artists, Incorporated. Both of these community organizations are 501c3 non-profit groups looking to make a difference in the community.

Beltsville Community Cats is an organization whose mission is to “To work with residents and businesses to humanely manage and reduce the number of free roaming "community" cats in Beltsville, Maryland.” The organization provides many services including trapping stray cats throughout the Beltsville Community, helping the trapped cats get either spayed or neutered, coordinating stays of cats that have been



trapped, including the night the cat was trapped and post-surgery hold up time, and placing young kittens in foster homes. They meet regularly at Emmanuel and are always looking for volunteers. 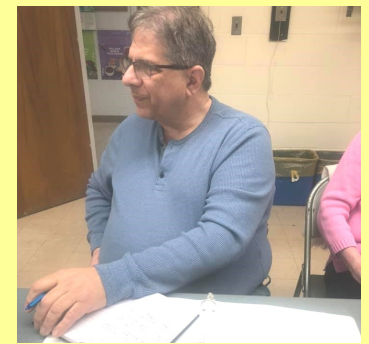

The group got to know Methodists from other places and built stone walks and stone structures for troughs for the goats and sheep.

In January, GYTTE hosted a group from Virginia with three new workers and seven who had worked with GYTTE several times. This group also built two new troughs for the animals and began a home for



Veronica and her family who had been living in a makeshift house behind her mom's home. The Palapa was scraped, spackled and painted. The group also spent time with former staff member Juan Lauro who is very debilitated with little use of his arms and legs. He enjoyed it and told some great stories.

GYTTE's regular training activities continue and they facilitate day workshops and tours of the center by groups—schools, universities or church groups.

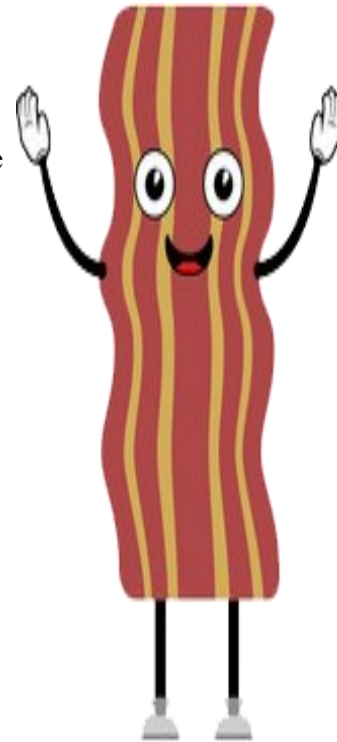

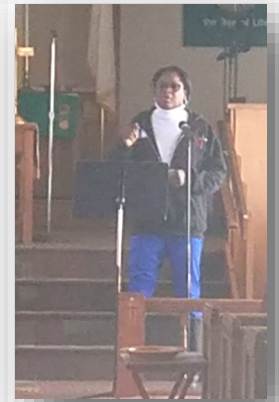

Methodist Pie Recipe: A Layered Pie with a Graham Cracker Crust

Layer 1:

1 Cup of Pecans, 1 Cup of Graham Cracker Crumbs, 1 stick of melted Margarine/Butter, 2 tablespoons of sugar. Mix ingredients and press into a sheet cake pan, Bake at 350° for 15 minutes. Let it cool.

Layer 2:

8 oz of cream cheese— softened, 1 cup of powdered sugar, 12 oz. of cool whip or whipped cream. Mix ingredients and spread over the crust.

Layer 3:

1 large box of instant chocolate pudding, 1 large box of instant vanilla pudding, 3 1/2 cups of cold milk, 1 teaspoon of vanilla. Mix ingredients and beat until they are thick. Pour and spread them over layer 2.

Layer 4:

Top the pie with cool whip or whipped cream and sprinkle with pecans. Chill and enjoy!

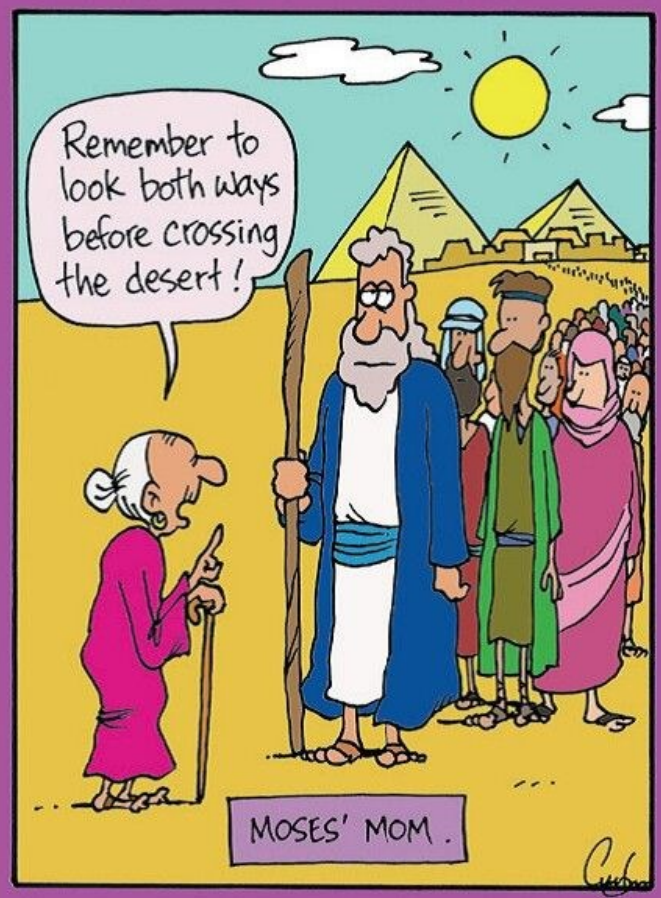

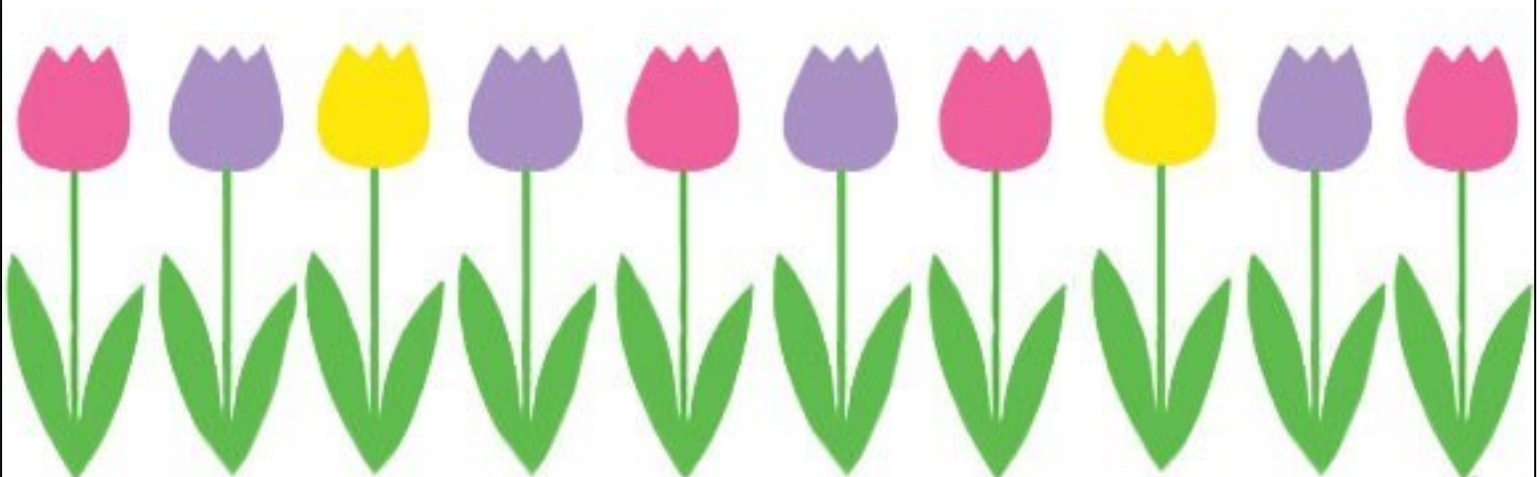
