One of Emmanuel UMC's Community Partners that secures affordable housing for families in the state of Maryland contacted the church and requested assistance in providing a mattress to a senior who was placed in housing but was literally sleeping on the floor. The case manager originally said that they wanted to get a twin bed for this gentleman. After arrangements were made to have the mattress delivered, I called "Mr. John Doe Jones" to verify his address.

In our conversation Mr. Jones revealed that he was over 6 feet tall, 200-plus pounds, and had just had a full hip replacement. He said that he had been sleeping upright in a straight back chair, and someone recently loaned him a twin size air mattress.

Mr. Jones went on to say, "I appreciate the loan of the mattress, but it is so low on the floor, I have to almost scale the wall to get upright... I feel like Spider-Man!"

After that conversation, it was clear Mr. Jones needed a bigger bed, and a complete mattress set with bed a bedframe was delivered to him by one of our other community partners the very next day. When Mr. Jones received the delivery he excitedly called to say thanks, adding, "Where is you church? I will have to come (when I get more mobile) to tell them how grateful I am!"

"My church is in Beltsville," I said. However, Mr. Jones now lives in Baltimore City, as a result of being selected in a public housing lottery.

He responded, "I used to live in Beltsville 15 years ago when my mother was still alive. Are you the church on the corner ....?" "No, our church in on Cedar Lane," I retorted.


He further inquired, "Just past the 7-11 on Powder Mill, past Emack, and right on Cedar?"

"That's exactly right!"

He, continued, "I used to live in one of the houses on Cedar Lane when I lived in Beltsville!"

Mr. Jones mentioned other landmarks where we seem to have been in the same places at different times, and concluded, " God has purposely brought us together!"

I responded, "Wow, look at God! After all these years God has made a connection between us! That's what we call that a Wesley Love Connection!"



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#### And This Is Christmas!

Trustee Karen Mackey made the excellent suggestion of putting up a Chrismon Tree for the first time since Covid-19. After a brief discussion about getting a live or artificial tree, Karen found a super sale on a beautiful 6 foot tree at Home Depot



for \$60. The church administrator attempted to place an online order for the sales item but could not find the tree in-stock in nearby stores.

Meanwhile the Black Clergy Women's Christmas Gathering was scheduled in a few days, and some PVC pipes needed to be purchased and cut to build a framework for a backdrop.

Well, what should have been a 30 minute store experience turned into a morning long customer dissatisfaction saga, beginning with store associates giving incorrect information about goods and services available at the store, which resulted in frustration, vexation, and a call to customer relations.

Once store management found out about the matter, in short order a call came from the store manager to investigate the concern, with her afterwards pronouncing: I do not know why the store associates said Home Depot does not cut pipes because we cut pipes in all our 2097 stores!

After a profuse apology about the PVC pipes, the Home Depot donated a Christmas tree and asked for a

recommendation of families to bless at Christmas!

What's more incredible is that a family of a mother of 7 children who tragically lost their father was lifted up by the Black Clergy Women at their Christmas Gathering, and Home Depot selected them as one of the families to bless!

#### The History of Chrismons

In 1940, Reverend George Pass, an elderly minister who visited her home during the Christmas season, influenced Frances Kipps Spencer. Reverend Pass was from a poor church and, in order to acquire the materials to make decorations, asked Mrs. Spencer for her discarded wrappings. His creations from these meager materials were then shared with his congregation.

Reverend Pass' great devotion moved Mrs. Spencer and her husband, Harry, to continue the tradition and make their own ornaments for decoration of their tree. In 1957, Mrs. Spencer volunteered to be in charge of the decorations for her church,

The Ascension Lutheran Church of Danville, Va. She decided instead of traditional balls and colored lights, that handmade ornaments would be more appropriate.

Mrs. Spencer began to study the monograms of Christ and, after discovering the Latin word chrisma, the name Chrismon was born. Four instructional books were written by Mrs. Spencer with the help of her congregation so that this "ministry" might be shared throughout the United States and the world.

As the popularity of Chrismon making grew, it became increasingly difficult to get supplies. In 1964, Rufty's Garden Shop in Salisbury, NC became the chief supplier of Chrismon components. Harold and Barbara Rufty searched and found manufactures in New York and Japan who could supply the necessary materials for making Chrismons.

One should not underestimate the contributions of Harold Rufty to the growth of Mrs. Spencer's Ministry. He was willing to satisfy this small market ignored by the established crafts industry.

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#### The Gifts of the Magi




In January the Church commemorates the Epiphany, the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi (or wise men) as conveyed in Matthew 2:1–12.

According to Matthew 2:11, wise men "...opened their treasures and presented [Jesus] with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh."

The Magi were prophets in their own right, and all of their gifts were prophetic in terms of what each gift reaveled to the world about who Jesus was and foreshadowed what would become of his short life on earth.

The gold symbolized Jesus' kingship, the frankincense symbolized his priesthood, and the myrrh symbolized his suffering.



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#### History of Hymns: 'A Charge to Keep I Have'

#### "A Charge to Keep I Have" Charles Wesley

The United Methodist Hymnal, No. 413 A charge to keep I have, a God to glorify, a never dying soul to save, and fit it for the sky.



In their recent book, Presidential Praise: Our Presidents and Their Hymns (Mercer University Press, 2008), authors C. Edward Spann and Michael E. Williams Sr. note that the title of President George W. Bush's autobiography, A Charge to Keep, was drawn from Charles Wesley's hymn.

The choice of this title is but one indication of the role this hymn has played in the life of President Bush, as well as the influence of this hymn 250 years beyond its composition.

As is the case with hymns by the Wesleys, "A charge to keep I have" is grounded in Scripture. In this case, Leviticus 8:35 is the primary source: "Keep the charge of the Lord, that ye die not" (KJV).

The hymn was included in Short Hymns on Select Passages of Holy Scripture (1762), a massive two-volume collection of 2,030 hymns based on biblical texts from Genesis to Revelation. UM Hymnal editor Carlton Young also

points out additional references: 2 Peter 1:10, Hosea 6:2, and Matthew 25:30 and 26:41.

Wesley scholars F. Hildebrandt and Oliver A. Beckerlegge propose in their commentary on the important Wesley hymnbook A Collection of Hymns for Use of the People Called Methodists (1780) that Charles Wesley (1708-1788) based his text on Mathew Henry's Commentary on Leviticus. Henry notes:

"We have every one of us a charge to keep, an eternal God to glorify, an immortal soul to provide for, needful duty to be done, our generation to serve; and it must be our daily care to keep this charge, for it is the charge of the Lord our Master, who will shortly call us to an account about it, and it is our peril if we neglect it. Keep it 'that ye die not'; it is death, eternal death, to betray the truth we are charged with."

This hymn is an unequivocal call to commitment to follow the Master and to fulfill our vocation through service. The language is unambiguous. Our calling is to save a "never dying soul" and "fit it for the sky"—that is for eternal life with Christ. This eschatological goal is central to Charles Wesley's hymns: Our goal is heaven.

In the second stanza, we find that we fulfill this calling by our service to "the present age." Fulfilling this calling requires us to engage "all [our] powers." The third stanza is a petition that God should "arm [us] with jealous care" as we live in God's sight. Wesley is not afraid to offer a stern admonition that we will one day be required to give "a strict account" of our activities in pursuit of our calling.

The final stanza is perhaps the most uncompromising. The singer begins with the imperative verb—a petition to the unnamed Holy Spirit—to "Help me to watch and pray . . . " Rather than suggesting a positive reward for faithfulness, Wesley warns us of the outcome "if [we] our trust betray": we "shall forever die."

Hymnology scholar Fred D. Gealy notes that there have been several attempts to alter the final lines in order to soften the ominous judgment that is implied. The Historical Companion to the influential Hymns Ancient and Modern concludes the hymn with these two lines:

And let me ne'er my trust betray, But press to realms on high.

The British Methodist hymnal, Hymns and Psalms (1983) altered the final two lines as follows:

So shall I not my trust betray, nor love within me die.

Professor Gealy notes that the "alteration [of these lines] weakens the intensity of the hymn. The Gospel always comes with [both] threat and promise."

This hymn has traditionally been a favorite at annual conferences, or in African-American congregations at the conclusion of Holy Communion. The tune BOYLSTON was composed by the famous New England music educator Lowell Mason (1792-1872) and was first found in his The Choir, or Union Collection of Church Music (1832).

#### **Cooking with Pastor King: Beet Red Velvet Cake**

#### **Ingredients:**

#### Beet red velvet cake batter:

- 1 3/4 cups all purpose flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons natural cocoa powder
- 1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 1/2 cups grated beetroots
- 1/3 cup buttermilk
- 1 tablespoon distilled white vinegar
- 1 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 eggs, at room temperature
- 1/2 cup unsalted butter, room temperature

#### **Directions:**

#### Beet red velvet cake:

Preheat oven to 350 F. Line a 12-hole muffin tin with cupcake liners. Sift flour, sugar, cocoa powder and baking powder into large bowl. Set aside.

Place grated beetroots, buttermilk, white vinegar, and vanilla extract in a food processor. Process until smooth. Add butter and eggs. Process until just combined. Add beetroot mixture into the flour mixture. Gently fold. Fill each hole in the muffin tin with 1/4 cup of batter. Bake for 20-25 minutes or until a wooden toothpick or skewer inserted into the middle of the cupcakes come out clean. Transfer onto a wire rack to cool completely.

#### Cream cheese frosting:

Place butter, half of sugar and vanilla extract in a large bowl. Using an electric mixer, beat until smooth. Add remaining sugar and cream cheese. Combine ingredients, but do not over blend. Frost cupcakes and enjoy!

Cream cheese frosting:

- 1/2 cup unsalted butter, softened
- 1 1/4 cups powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 8 ounces cream cheese, softened.
