"Those who believe that selfinterest should be brought under the discipline of a higher law could then be termed "the children of light." This is no mere arbitrary device: for evil is always the assertion of some self-interest without regard to the whole, whether the whole be conceived as the immediate community, or the total community of mankind, or the total order of the world. ... Our democratic civilization has been built, not by children of darkness but by foolish children of light." Reinhold Niebuhr

These are the thoughts of Reinhold Niebuhr the early 20th Century American theologian who is best known for challenging Christians to get involved in the realities of modern politics and diplomacy. Niebuhr's assertion concerning the lack of political involvement by Christians is not new. Niebuhr's words echo the cries and admonitions of the Old Testament prophets who constantly reminded the people of Israel to

fight against the injustices permitted by their kings and even religious leaders. Whether you consider yourself political or not, or whether you are presently involved in campaigning for your favorite political candidate, blue, red or green, Niebuhr's call goes beyond party lines. Niebuhr identifies us, the Christians, as "the children of light" who need to set aside political preferences and personal opinions and become "foolish" in seeking to bring the light of Christ to our world and society.

In "The Parable of the Shrewd Manager," Luke 16, Jesus too confronts and challenges our assumption about the way we need to act in our fight against the darkness of evil. The parable tells the story of a manager who was fired without explanation. With not much left to do, he plans and plots ways to take advantage of his situation by making "under the table" deals with his master's clients in order to earn their favor. His shrewd creativity surprised even his master. "... His master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light." (Luke 16:8) No, Jesus is not encouraging and complementing cheating. Jesus is encouraging and complementing the manager's "never giving up" attitude when facing adversity. The manager's actions showed a determination that the children of light seem to lack.

Do we have that attitude when facing adversity? Do we have that attitude when facing evil? Do we have that attitude when facing no? Have you given up in your plans to serve God because you don't have everything you think you "need" to do it "right?" Are you quitting your plans to help others because people didn't respond the way you expected? Don't give up, be creative, be persistent, be shrewd.

One last thought about Reinhold Niebuhr. Do you remember the "Serenity Prayer?" Well, he was the author. Our job as "the children of light," to do what is right, begins and ends with God. When you face adversity or darkness, remember his prayer:

God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and wisdom to know the difference. Living one day at a time; Enjoying one moment at a time; Accepting hardships as the pathway to peace; Taking, as He did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it; Trusting that He will make all things right if I surrender to His Will; That I may be reasonably happy in this life and supremely happy with Him Forever in the next.

175th Anniversary Weekend September 17 - 18, 2011

Get your tickets for our Anniversary Dinner and Silent Auction now! On Saturday, September 17th at 6:30 p.m., we shall gather at the Knights of Columbus Hall to dine on beef and chicken prepared by Cherry Hill Manor Caterers. Besides dinner, there will be great entertainment and some special surprises. Knowing money is tight, the Anniversary Committee set the ticket price at \$35 per person. This will cover the cost of the dinner and related expenses. Seating is limited, so buy your tickets early. They are available at the table in the Narthex Sunday mornings, or you can call me at 301-937-7070.

To raise additional funds to renovate the kitchen, the evening also will include a silent auction. A silent auction doesn't have an auctioneer describing each item and soliciting bids. Instead, all of the items are displayed on tables. Next to each item is a bid sheet. To bid on an item, each person writes his/her name down on the bid sheet, together with the amount of the bid. If another bidder is willing to pay a higher amount, he or she writes his/

her name and bid below the previous bid. The first bidder may raise his/her bid by writing his/her name below the 2nd bidder, and so on. There is no limit to how many people can bid on a particular item or how many times one person may bid on an item. The bidding can get just as heated as at a "regular" auction if an item is especially popular, but it is done "silently," in writing. All bidding ends at a specified time, and whoever is the highest bidder at that point is awarded the item. Auction items will include gift cards to local restaurants and free or discounted services by local businessmen. Participation in the silent auction is voluntary.

Join Charlie Deegan and Bill Raulin on the committee that solicits auction items! The silent auction will benefit both the businesses and our church, because the businesses get relatively inexpensive advertising guaranteed to reach current and potential customers, and Emmanuel gets funds to improve our kitchen facilities. Library / Media Center Upgrade Making Progress

The approved upgrade of Emmanuel UMC's library and media center is progressing. In the past month, Internet service has been extended to the center, some computers have been installed, and the library's book collection has been examined and triaged.

In June, fiber-optic Internet service was installed in the center and was also extended to the church office, replacing the office's previous Internet service. Members of the Media Center Upgrade Steering Committee have set up 4 computers in the center and have acquired 4 more computers that may be installed. Computers are being acquired using grant funds and donations.

In July, members of the Committee from a variety of church ministries began examining the library's book collection to determine which items should be kept for use by the church and its various ministries and which items could be repurposed to other groups and organizations. The Committee has retained all Bibles, reference books, children's books and Bible story books, videocassette tapes, hymnals, textbooks, historic books, and books younger than 20 years old.

The remaining books have been set aside in boxes. If you or your ministry would like to examine any of the remaining books, you may do so through the end of August. Please contact Patrick Elliott, Todd Reitzel, or Rick Bergmann to arrange to view them on Sunday

during the education period between services. All remaining books that are not claimed by church members will be donated to an outside organization that would benefit from them.



A number of church history records remain in the library / media center, and all will be retained toward possible relocation elsewhere in the church, to make room for the new media resources.

Shelving will be removed from the center in coming weeks, and volunteers will repaint the room before reinstallation of some of the shelving and reorganization of the above categories of books that will be kept. Furniture to hold the computers will be acquired and installed thereafter.

The Committee has been working with the Trustees to develop a security and room-access plan. A new door lock has been installed and keys distributed to some ministries that have planned to use the media center. Going along with the pastoral visitation team on Wednesdays has been a real blessing for me.
