2017 SIMPLE LIFE DURING LENT

Lent is a period of time to follow in the footsteps of Jesus, especially focusing on his trial, suffering and cross for each of us. It starts from Ash Wednesday and ends with Easter Sunday. It is a 40-day journey,

excluding Sundays. The Sundays during Lent are exempt from Lenten disciplines because Sunday is based on the resurrection of Jesus. Christians usually join this journey with spiritual disciplines, prayer, penitence, almsgiving, and self-denial.

I like to call the Lenten journey the "Simple Life" which reorganizes life without bubbles; in other words, "giving up luxuries."

As pastor, I would like to suggest some specific ways for the church to observe Lent in 2017:

1. Share the love of Jesus with at least one person.

If you are more than 12 in age, I ask you to choose a person who does not believe in God or does not attend church. You can pray for that person. You can share the love of God with that person before Easter. It could be a phone call, email, greeting card or personal conversation. You can have a meaningful religious, spiritual, or Christian conversation with that person to share the love of God. You can also invite the person to church.

2. Play less.

Please find out what you spend most of your time on, such as playing games, watching movies, or hobbies. Check if it is good for your spiritual health. Count how many hours you spend a day, or a week, doing those things. If it is too much, please reduce it by 30%.

3. Eat less.

In a Christian sense, fasting means eating one full meal and two small meals a day. If possible, try to keep this. But children, youth, seniors, and the sick are exempt from this practice because they need sufficient nourishment for health.

4. Spend less.

You can avoid buying unnecessary items other than food and necessities. For example, try not to use credit cards too much, or do not go to the Mall for luxuries, or do not dine out too often.

5. Read the Bible or a Devotional.

Please choose one devotional, such as the Lenten Devotional written by church members, <u>The Upper Room or The Purpose-Driven Life</u>. Please read it daily. Daily scripture readings are listed on page 2, as well.

6. Come to church.

Most of all, do not miss the Lenten Sundays and Ash Wednesday, Holy Thursday and Good Friday Services. These services are focused on the meaning of Lent. I ask you to come to church on Palm Sunday, as well, to enjoy the Cantata. There will be only one service that day, at 10AM. It is all-gathering Sunday. Finally, join us Easter Sunday to celebrate the end of our Lenten journey.

7. Give Sacrificially.

Cut back on non-essential spending and offer the savings to the church's general fund at the end of the Lenten journey on Easter Sunday. You may wish to set a goal of a certain dollar amount per day, times 40 days. Choose an amount that is right for you.

In a nutshell, Lent is a time of faithful commitment to spiritual discipline in every aspect of a Christian's daily life, not only monetary, but also dietary, spending, playing, reading, and worshipping. Please make your own plan and goals on the basis of the above suggestions. If possible, I strongly encourage you as members of the church to join the Lenten journey together.

WHAT IS ASH WEDNESDAY?

In Western Christianity, Ash Wednesday marks the first day, or the beginning, of the season of Lent, which starts 40 days prior to Easter (Sundays are not included in the count).

Day 46: Psalm 32:8

Lent is a time when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation, and spiritual discipline. During the Ash Wednesday service, the pastor will lightly rub the sign of the cross with ashes onto the foreheads of worshipers.

The Bible does not mention Ash Wednesday or the custom of observing Lent. However, the practice of repentance and mourning in ashes is found in 2 Samuel 13:19; Esther 4:1; Job 2:8; Daniel 9:3; and Matthew 11:21.





"For to everyone who has will more be given, and he will have an abundance. But from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away." ~Matthew 25:29

When we hear "stewardship" most of us associate it with money. Money is only 25% of what stewardship is made of. Stewardship is comprised of 4 parts that we all commit to doing when we take our vow of confirmation. The four parts are presence, gifts, service and prayers.

PRESENCE

Presence (noun) \'pre-zən(t)s\: Being there

Most of us begin following Christ by coming to Sunday worship. Lent offers each of us the opportunity to grow in our faith by experiencing more:

- Ash Wednesday service (March 1, 7 PM, at Emmanuel)
- Lenten Bible study (Thursdays starting March 2, 7 PM, at Panera Bread)
- Start attending a Sunday class (Sundays, 10:15-11:00 AM)
- Maundy Thursday service with seder tasting (April 13, 7 PM, at Emmanuel)
- Good Friday Tenebrae service (April 14, 7 PM, at Emmanuel)

Take the opportunity to attend at least one of these this Lenten season! Which will you attend?

GIFTS

Many Christians throughout the world observe Lent. Catholic, Orthodox, and Protestant worshipers benefit from this annual season of sacrifice and simplicity. Christians are simply imitating the practices and teachings of Jesus.

For the last few years, Emmanuel has practiced the concept of financial fasting. What does this mean? This is the practice of giving up something during Lent and putting the money aside for the church. The challenge this year is to give up a cup of coffee or a dinner out each week, and put that money aside. If you are like me and are concerned that you may spend it before Easter, why not bring your gift weekly or monthly? You can mark it "Lenten gift" and place it in the offering plate. If this is not comfortable for you, bring in your loose change and drop it in the bank in the hallway outside the sanctuary. Everyone can spare some change.

As we enter this time of reflection and sacrifice, we ask that you prayerfully consider participating.

Missionaries---Who They Are and What They Do

"Missionary" is one of the oldest and most honored offices of the Christian church, with origins in the New Testament. Letters of Paul are those of a missionary called and commissioned to Jesus Christ.

Missionaries witness and serve in dramatically different locales and cultures, and engage in a range of professions and activities. They come from many places and backgrounds.

Missionaries are a tangible connection between the church and mission. In a real sense, all faithful Christians are missionaries. Those who convey the Good News of God's love and forgiveness to others near and far carry the missionary spirit within them.

United Methodist mission personnel commissioned by the General Board of Global Ministries are supported through three major avenues:

- Of primary importance is the <u>World Service Fund</u>, one of eight funds to which congregations contribute through their apportionments. It provides basic financial resources for the core ministries of our denomination, underwriting the work of Global Ministries and its mission personnel, as well as the work of other general agencies of the church.
- Secondly, a portion of support for all mission personnel comes from the Pledge to Mission from local <u>United Methodist Women</u> units, channeled through the Women's Division of Global Ministries.
- The third avenue of support is through <u>The Advance</u>, the second-mile giving channel of The United Methodist Church.

Covenant Relationship Program

Since 1974, the Covenant Relationship Program has enabled United Methodist congregations to surround our mission personnel with love and prayer, and to grow in understanding the context in which these missionaries serve by learning about the place of service and its people, culture, traditions and religious life.
