That day is not something I have ever looked back on with regret, obviously I'd prefer to not be in a wheelchair, but I don't think of it all and wonder what if, or wonder why. As you will understand when you read the events of that day, far from being unlucky at becoming paralyzed, I am lucky to be alive. I look at the 24th of April as the luckiest day of my life and the start of just another chapter in my life."

These are the words of Andy Campbell, a professional skier and self-proclaimed "wheel chair adventurer." His life was highlighted in the 2009 ski movie "Dynasty", produced by the renowned ski icon Warren Miller. Despite the many setbacks and tragedies he has faced, Andy's life and professional accomplishments represent that picture of hope that needs to be engraved in our hearts and minds as we begin a new year. A BLAST FROM THE PAST

In our first effort, Mildred Bladen gave us this letter that she received on July 12, 1954. As you read this letter, you will see the clear intention of the Committee on Policy to open wide the doors of our church to the community. What a great testimony. Fifty-five years later our church is doing and trying new ways to make our church a safe place for the youth in our community. I hope you will be inspired by the bold message of this letter. In many ways, this is a prophetic letter with prophetic words for what we want to do and become in 2010, a church of "Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors."

July 12, 1954

RECOMMENDATION TO E OFFICIAL BOARD

It is the opinion of the Committee on Policy that the church and its facilities should be "service to the entire community regardless of church membershi. We recommend the establishment of a broad, progressive recreational and social program which will supplement the spiritual tork of the church in the community. 

CHURCH COUNCIL

The New Year is upon us. Emmanuel made it through 2009 in remarkable shape considering the economy. While 2010 doesn't look much better for our country and community financially, we continue to pray and hope for better days ahead. Spiritually our church family is doing very well. Our ministries are growing as well as our membership. We pray that our good works continue to grow. However, we are very close to ending 2009 in a fiscal deficit and unlike the federal government we can't just print more money. Now don't get me wrong - the lights aren't in danger of going out. But we do need to be ever vigilant of our spending habits. While everything we do as a church family seems necessary, the reality of the dollar has to be considered.

The Church Council set forth an ambitious budget for 2010. But the number of pledge cards that have been turned in is down from last year. This is not a good way to start the year. At our next Church Council meeting we must decide to either cut our budget or find a way to raise some dollars. Deciding whether to cut programs (and if so, by how much) is never easy, but it is particularly difficult if we don't know how much money we can expect to have coming in. That's why receiving pledge cards from our members is so important. So I am asking that you look into your heart and return a pledge card for 2010 ASAP. Now remember, nobody will ever say a word to you if you are unable to keep your pledge or if you give more than your pledge amount. As a matter of fact, no one but the Financial Secretary will even know how much you pledge/give. But that little pledge card will go a long way toward helping your church leadership plan this year's events. So please, turn in a pledge card with the amount you think you will give this year, if you haven't already done so. That will give the Financial Secretary an estimate of the amount Emmanuel can expect to receive. The Council will take it from there.

On a related subject, Todd Reitzel has served as both Financial Secretary and Sunday School Superintendent at Emmanuel for the past year. Given the amount of time Todd has been devoting to the Sunday School, he has asked to be relieved as

Financial Secretary in 2010. So we need a volunteer for that job. It requires a detail-oriented person who can spare about an hour a week to record the contributions, plus a couple of hours every three months to print and mail the quarterly statements. The good news is that a computer program is already set up, so the hard work has been done for you!

If detailed computer work is not your thing, I have one other volunteer job open that should be very rewarding. The congregation now worshipping at Emmanuel United Methodist Church will be 175 years old in 2011! We need someone to head up our 175th Anniversary Committee. Ways to observe this auspicious occasion are limited only by our imaginations, so here's a great opportunity for a creative team leader. The Chairman of the 175th Anniversary Committee will have a lot of help from every member of the Church Council. We just need someone to guide observation of this very special occasion throughout the year.

As you see, there are a number of ways to serve God and our church besides giving money. Giving your time is just as valuable. If you are interested in serving as Financial Secretary or in leading or serving on the 175th Anniversary Committee, give me a call at 301-937-7070.

If you had stopped by the church during the evening of December 4th you would have been greeted by the aroma of chocolate chip, sugar and peanut butter cookies baking in the kitchen ovens. Attending these yummy treats were the ten members of Girl Scout Troop 4129 accompanied by their leader, Debbie Mast. Most of these 9th grade girls (and two 8th graders) have been meeting every other week at Emmanuel for the last four to five years with Ms. Mast as their leader.

At this level, Ms. Mast said, "It is a girl run Troop." They set up their calendar and always include a service project. The recipients of the program at CPC were grateful for the special treats and especially thankful that a group of Girl Scouts would take the time to do something for them. 
FOOD CLOSET

HOMELESS MINISTRY

The Homeless Ministry has been incredibly blessed in 2009! God was quite busy working through the membership of our congregation, and many others. This year, our congregation surpassed our own abilities in serving our homeless brothers and sisters in Christ. Over the course of the year we served over 1,600 people, providing the most basic of necessities to many of them, including meals, toiletry kits, socks, shoes, pants, shirts, blankets and warm weather necessities.

I know many of you have not had the opportunity to go to D.C. and serve the meals to the individuals, so please let me share some of that experience with you now. One of our dearest friends on the route is Jesse, called Mr. Thank You by many of us. Jesse never hesitates to show appreciation for the small comforts that are offered, even when nothing we have meets his particular needs. Despite hearing the appreciation from Jesse every trip, It wasn't until I encountered Jesse recently in another segment of life that I realized exactly how warm hearted our friend truly is. While waiting on a D.C. street for a tow truck, Jesse happened to come by. On this slightly chilly evening, on his way to eat the warm meal in hand, Jesse offered to wait with us till the tow truck arrived to be sure no harm came to us on the "dangerous streets" of D.C. What a tremendous sacrifice this gesture was for Jesse, warm meals are not easy to come by living on the street, yet Jesse was willing to let his meal go cold to insure we were ok. What a warm soul Jesse is, doing as we are reminded in Hebrews 13:16: "And do not forget to do good and to share with others,



for with such sacrifices God is pleased." (NIV) It is amazing how our homeless friends share themselves with us, just as much as we try to share our own blessings with them.

2010 promises to be a busy year in serving our homeless friends. Certainly God will challenge us with new opportunities to reach out and serve his people. As we continue to build our friendships with those we have been serving, many new faces appear each week. Through the Grace of God and the continued support of the congregation we will attempt to serve our Homeless brethren 12 times this year. Our first trip of the year will be on January 24th.

As noted earlier, distribution is frequently past many of our bedtimes (6: 30 p.m.- 12:00 a.m.), but that doesn't mean you can't help! Other ways to volunteer include: help sort clothing, assist with making lunches, donating clothing and/or food, and volunteering to help with the shopping. But if you find yourself able to go to D.C. and serve the people directly we welcome you to join us. Signup sheets can be found on the bulletin board near the coffee table.
